

The Underground Railroad was a system of secret routes and safe houses that runaways from slavery in the Southern U.S. used to make their way to freedom. It began around the time of the American Revolution and lasted until the Civil War. Most routes went north to Canada but some went south to Mexico and Caribbean islands. Participants signaled each other with codes. A "station" or "depot" was a safe house where fugitives could find food and shelter. "Tracks" were safe back roads and trails.

"Conductors" were people like Harriet Tubman who knew the routes well - and "parcels" or 'passengers" were Freedom Seekers themselves. Hanging quilts, knotted rope and the words of songs also were codes: "Swing Low,

Sweet Chariot" meant a conductor was nearby and escape would be Motherland soon - "Wade in the Water" was a Connextions


Mo' Better Buffalo

## Underground Railroad Tour (U.S.)

Visit the Michigan Street Baptist Church, a known Underground Railroad "station" and the oldest property continuously owned and occupied by African-Americans in Buffalo, NY. See the world's first tourist attraction, Niagara Falls, and learn about its relationship to the slave trade. See where Mother Moses (Harriet Tubman) herself crossed into Canaan (Canada) en route to her first home after escaping via the Underground Railroad.

## Underground Railroad Tour [Southern Ontario]

Hear the stories and see the sites that made up the African Canadian experience. Uncover what was the second leg of the Underground Railroad. Visit Harriet Tubman's first freedom home and place of worship - the British Methodist Episcopal Church (BME) "Salem Chapel" in St. Catharines, Ontario. Tour includes visit to a cemetery for former slaves, a libation ceremony and information on the meaning of "Canaan Land" and its importance to fugitive slaves.
